Stores stay open late, on Sundays for shoppers

Christmas shopping is in full swing, with Oberlin stores busy over and shoppers looking for that perfect gift.

The shopping season traditionally starts the Friday after Thanksgiving, which is exactly what happened in Oberlin this year. People were still in town from the Thanksgiving holiday and the annual Parade of Lights was held downtown, drawing a large crowd.

Stores will stay open from 1 to 4 until Christmas, with the exception of Christmas Eve, Dec. 24. There'll be late shopping the week before Christmas, with stores open until 7 p.m. Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, Dec. 20-22.

At Stanley Hardware, owner Joe Stanley said Friday was the busiest day of the weekend. He said they had shoppers in the store up until they closed about 8 p.m. that night.

Mr. Stanley said he wasn't sure if there was any one particular item that he sold more of than others, although it seemed a lot of people

were buying power tools. He said they made several special purchases on items this year and are

selling those to the customers for good prices. Currently, said Mr. Stanley, they have a Black and the weekend, promotions underway Decker cordless drill for almost half the regular price.

> Besides power tools, Stanley offers stuff for the home, yard, Christmas decorations and hardware.

At Rocking R, owner Karen Chambers said the holiday weekend had gone well for her. She added that she saw more people on Friday, but had more buyers on Saturday.

There wasn't any one item that sold extremely well, she said; it was p.m. on Sundays for shoppers up a little bit of everything with the emphasis on collectibles and the clothing line. She said she also sold a saddle and some tack.

Rocking R offers clothes for infants up to adults, horse supplies, collectibles and jewelry.

Gary Anderson, owner of the Oberlin Mercantile, said he thought they were busier than last year, with Saturday being his busiest day. Mr. Anderson said he sold a lot of Christmas ornaments, several dipped scented bears and some collectible

Food pantry crew sees increase in use of emergency stores

Use at the Decatur County Food Pantry is up this year compared to

Melanie Anderson, who works at the pantry at the United Church, said there have been a lot of people who have come through the pantry this year. People come here for jobs and then the job disappears, some are low income families and others need the extra help because of an ill-

This year to date, she said, 92 adults and 66 children have used the pantry while in 2005, 77 adults and 55 kids used the service.

The pantry has had 55 adults and 44 children who have used the service once, 19 adults and 14 kids who have used it twice and 21 adults and 10 children who have used it three times, this year.

The good thing is, said Ms. Anderson, is that donations have been up too, which has helped a lot. The pantry, which is run by the Decatur County Ministerial Association, gets donations from individuals, groups and churches around the area. Each church, she said, takes a month and the members

give an offering for the pantry. Ms. Anderson said both Raye's Grocery and Stanley Hardware do-

nate food every year.

The churches in Norcatur and Clayton have been taking up a monthly offering too, which helps

The pantry, she said, is open from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Monday and Thursday. Anyone who wants to use the service needs to bring a picture identification, such as a driver's license and proof of residency. Ms. Anderson said the person can bring
