Board member Delayne May asked about help pay for projects. He said he isn't sure the boiler and hot water heater and was told that if those fail the district doesn't have anywhere to take the students for the up to two weeks it would take to get replacements.

Mr. Glodt said he can get bids for the boiler and hot water heater.

Mrs. May said it's important to her to get the track, boiler, television lab and junior high electrical work done.

Mr. Glodt said last year the district was able to use supplemental general funds to projects.
