# School gets OK on audit

The Oberlin School Board received a clean audit report without any violations at the its meeting last Monday.

Superintendent Kelly Glodt said the district owes a clean report to the women who track its money, Vickie Lippelmann, board clerk; Pam Simonsson, superintendent's secretary; Carla Depperschmidt, grade school secretary; and Judy Marietta, high school secretary.

Mr. Glodt said the district was able to carry over balances from the 2006 budget to this year in accounts that are allowed to have carryover. The district is making a comeback, from just a few years ago when there wasn't any carryover.

No matter what, said Mr. Glodt, the district will always have to be careful with spending because of its declining enrollment.

He said the district probably will have to use its "reduction in force" policy because Sappa Valley Youth Ranch closed. Three full-time and two part-time teachers were assigned to the ranch.

By law, he said, teachers need to be told by May 1 if the district is not renewing their contracts based on the policy. Normally, said Mr. Glodt, the board tries to tell the teachers before that.

Mr. Glodt said they don't know for sure what will happen because some teachers might retire this year, although the board hasn't received any letters.

Mr. Glodt talked with the board about the roof at the high school, where snow and ice were causing a leak over the gym. Last Tuesday, Mr. Glodt; elementary Principal Duane Dorshorst; Terry Ream, outdoor maintenance supervisor; Brian Simonsson, transportation director; Ron Jansonius, technology coordinator; Kenny Black, plant facilities director; and elementary teacher Tim Thornton shoveled snow off the roof to help stop the leak.

Mr. Glodt said the district owes a big thanks to the city, county and Mick Barth for helping move the snow out of the parking lots and streets around the schools after the storm at the end of the year.

Both the city and the county helped plow the lanes outside the grade school, he said. In other business, the board:

•Heard that the electrical work in the junior high is being done. Mr. Glodt said they are putting in new

## Group planning session

The Decatur Tomorrow steering committee will hold its second "community conversation" from 5 to 7 p.m. Tuesday in the high school cafeteria.

Paul Shields, a committee member, said the group held the first conversation last April. Out of that came five areas for the committees to work on, Sappa Park, building a volunteer network, getting more out of existing facilities, intergenerational communication and marketing and economic development.

On Tuesday, said Mr. Shields, leaders from the five committees will talk about what their groups have done and what they want to do. After the review, he said, the crowd will break out into small groups.

• Accepted a gift of \$924 from the Knights of Columbus for the special education department.

• Heard that the district is looking for a custodian to work mainly at the high school

• Handed out forms for the superintendent's evaluation for board members to fill out. The board will hold a special meeting at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, Jan. 22, to discuss the evaluation.
