'Renew efforts to seek God'

Grace and peace to you in the name of Christ. My prayer for you today is that this New Year may be one of new beginnings as you seek God and strive to imitate Jesus Christ.

Many of us have a habit of making New Year's resolutions, and I'd like to suggest a few things you might consider. Perhaps one of these might be to begin or renew efforts to seek God by making a greater effort to imitate Christ. St. Thomas Acquinas gave some good advice for

those who seek God: "Great is the blindness and exceeding the folly of many souls that are ever seeking God, continuously sighing after God, and frequently desiring God: whilst, all the time, they are themselves the tabernacles of the Living God ... since their soul is the seat of God, in which he continuously reposes.'

As you seek to imitate Christ, take time to observe and recognize God's work in creation and in your own life. "Be still and know that he is God"

Another way to imitate Christ in your search for God will include the study of God's Word and those things great men or women have written about him. Walt Whitman found God in many places:

"I hear and behold God in every object, yet understand God not in the least, nor do I understand who there can be more wonderful than myself. Why should I wish to see God better than this day? I see something of God each hour of the twenty-four, and each moment then, in the faces of men and women I see God, and in my own face in the glass, I find letters from God dropped in the street, and every one is signed by God's name, and I leave them where they are, for I know that wheresoe er i go others will punctually come forever and ever."

Whitman found God in all of creation, where do you find God?

Certainly your search for God through the imi-

tation of Christ will include continual prayer. Soren Kierkegaard said: "A hasty kind of reasoning may hold that praying is an unprofitable act, because a man's prayer does not really change the unchangeable; but even if this in the process of time were desired, might not changeable man come easily to regret that he had changed God? The true kind of reasoning is therefore the only desirable kind as well; prayer does not change God, but changes him who prays.'

If you don't know how to pray, begin with this simple thought, "Lord, be merciful to me, a sinner." (Luke 18:13) Then find Matthew 6:5-15, where Jesus Christ himself teaches us how to pray. Ask God to help you learn and seek the help of others who have already had

In your search for God through the imitation of Christ, never forget to long for the hope of immortality that overcomes the fears of this life and comes from the love of Christ. Helen Keller, wrote, "I believe in the immortality of the soul because I have within me immortal longings. I believe that the state we enter after death is wrought by our own motives, thoughts and deeds. I believe that in the life to come I shall have the senses I have not had here, and that my home there will be beautiful with color, music, the speech of flowers and faces I love."

We may not all have the same concept of the heavenly kingdom as Helen Keller, but we must all believe the words of Christ, that he has gone to prepare a place for us and when it is ready, he will return for us, that where he is we may be also. (John 14:1-3)

As you make your New Year's resolutions for 2007, may you seek God through the imitation of Jesus Christ that your joy may be complete (John 15:11), may your search reveal Jesus in everyone you meet (John 14:15-21), may you learn to pray continually (11 nessalonians 5:15-24), and may your search for God through the imitation of Jesus Christ give you the assurance of eternal hope in Christ Jesus our Lord (1 John 5:11-12).


