Application signed for grant money for hospital job

The Decatur County Commissioners signed the application forms on behalf of the Decatur County Hospital for a \$600,000 grant from the United States Department of Agriculture at the meeting Tuesday.

Steve Barber, with the agency, said he needed a signature from the chairman and the county clerk for the forms. The commissioners voted to approve the two signatures on the

Mr. Barber said the application is for \$600,000 with the hospital contributing 20 percent, or \$150,000.

With this, he said, the county needs to have a public hearing. Mr. Barber said anytime federal funds are applied for, a public hearing has to be held. The commissioners set the hearing for Tuesday, Feb. 20.

The commissioners signed the resolution stating that the low bidder gets the project, unless there is a really good reason not to accept it.

Mr. Barber said he also needs an attorney's opinion which states that the county knows the organization, the hospital, and that they are lined up correctly under Kansas law.

Is there a preliminary architecture plan, said Mr. Barber, which includes where the site is and the cost estimates. Hospital Administrator Lynn Doeden said she can get the information from the architect. The hospital, she said, has already received bids that were within \$50,000 of the price.

How long are the bids good for? asked Mr. Barber. Thirty days, said Connie Grafel, with the hospital board. She said the board didn't accept any of the bids. Currently the loan, said Mr. Bar-

ber, hasn't been approved. The hospital board is ahead of the agency, Ms. Grafel said the board talked

Accepting the bid is based on the approval of the loan, said Commissioner Stan McEvoy, or is the board going to go ahead and accept it. Ms. Grafel said they will have to discuss also try to be here.

The food in the cart will be donated to the Decatur County Food Pantry. This event will celebrate the

affordability of food produced by America's farmers and ranchers, said Mrs. Bremer. According to statistics provided by the U.S. Dept of Agriculture, the average American spends only 10% of his or her disposable personal income to pay for food. In just 36 calendar days the average American will have earned enough income to pay for their family's annual food supply. That same family has to work 52

days each year to pay for health and medical care, 62 days to pay for housing/household operations, and 77 days to pay their federal taxes. Farmers and ranchers receive only 19 cents out of every dollar spent on food at home and away from home. The rest goes for costs beyond the farm gate: wages, materials for production, processing, marketing, transportation and distribution. Approximately 17% of the total U.S. workforce produce, process, sell and trade the nation's food and fiber, but only 2% of the total U.S. population live on farms.
