


When you add all these up, you get math teacher Pat Dorshorst.

Mrs. Dorshorst has been teaching in Oberlin for 24 years. She has taught classes from algebra to calculus and junior high physical education. She is currently teaching Applied Math I and II, Algebra II, statistics and trigonometry.

Mrs. Dorshorst grew up in Dalton, Neb., with three sisters and three brothers, two of whom were cousins that her parents raised. In high school she participated in volleyball, basketball, track, band, choir, speech, Future Homemakers of America and cheerleading.

She also excelled in volleyball and basketball and went on to Eastern Wyoming College to play both sports. While there, she competed in two National Junior College Athletic Association national volleyball tournaments and two National Junior College Athletic Association national basketball tournaments.
