The Decatur County commissioners agreed for the county to pay for the liability insurance for the county's economic development group for the Business Entrepreneurial Enhancement Center on Greg Lohoefener, with the eco-

nomic development group, said the cost of the liability insurance for a year through Kansas Counties Association Multi-Lined Pool is \$2,286. The reason, he said, he's asking for help with the bill on the group's behalf is that most of its cash is tied up in matching funds for Mr. Lohoefener said the eco-

nomic group is making payments to Prairie Land Electric for a 1 percent interest loan. He said the group has paid for a year and by next year there should be more available cash. With the airport project coming

up, he said, the group may need to start putting aside money to help or to hire a firm to promote the project, although this isn't a certainty right now, he said.
