Now is the time to begin picking up your activity level after a long, challenging winter when it was more difficult to get outside to walk, be active and exercise. You may also want to begin acting on those New Year's resolutions to get more fit.

Walk Kansas - an 8-week walking and exercise program for all interested individuals - just started Sunday and will run through May 5. Walk Kansas is sponsored by K-State Research and Extension offices all over the state.

The goal is for a team of 6 people to walk 423 miles, the equivalent of walking across the state of Kansas, in an 8-week time period. You don't have to walk across the state all by yourself. This is a team total, and boils down to each member setting a goal to cover about 1.75 miles per day.

If you would like to participate in this fun walking program, call the county extension office and ask for a captain's packet. The group will then need to pick a team name, se-

lect a captain, fill out individual registration forms and pay \$5 per person to participate. Checks should be made payable to the extension office.

Registrations will be accepted until Friday. So act quickly if you have not already picked up your packet.

Every team member will receive a small gift of appreciation for walking and participating. If you participated last year in Walk Kansas and did not receive your gift, please contact your team captain or the extension office. A few team gift bags from last year have still have not been picked up.

The purchase of Walk Kansas T-shirts is optional. They are available for \$5, in addition to the individual registration fee.

'Christ Is Risen'

It was May Day, 1990. The place - Moscow's Red Square.

"Is it straight, Father?" one Orthodox priest asked another, shifting the heavy, 8-foot crucifix on his shoulder.

"Yes," said the other. "It is straight." Together the two priests, along with a group of parishioners holding ropes that steadied the beams of the huge cross, walked the parade route.

Before them passed the official might of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics: The usual May Day procession of tanks, missiles, troops, and salutes to the Communist party elite.

Behind the tanks surged a giant crowd of protesters, shouting up at Mikhail Gorbachev. "Bread! ... Freedom! ... Truth!"

As the throng passed directly in front of the Soviet leader standing in his place of honor, the priests

hoisted their heavy burden toward the sky. The cross emerged from the crowd. As it did, the figure of Jesus Christ obscured the giant poster faces of Karl Marx, Friedrich Engels, and Vladimir Lenin that provided the backdrop for Gorbachev's reviewing stand.

"Mikhail Sergeevich!" one of the priests shouted, his deep voice cleaving the clamor of the protesters and piercing straight toward the angry Soviet leader. "Mikhail Sergeevich! Christ is risen!"

As we proceed through this season of Lent we are not mourning the loss of a potential savior, we are instead grieving over our lives of sin which required our Savior's temporary loss of life in order for us to receive salvation.

Indeed, Lent is the preparation time for us as Easter Sunday approaches, to carry the cross high and yell to all the world, "Christ is risen!"
