County discusses incentives

The Decatur County commissioners agreed last Tuesday to a suggestion from the county appraiser to invite the vice president of Bus and Coach International in to talk about the county economic development incentive program.

Appraiser Alan Hale talked with the commissioners about the firm's property. He said he normally meets with people to discuss any new property that comes on the tax rolls; the building used to be the Jennings School.

Mr. Hale said he thought it was his duty to let the company's representatives know that the county has an economic development incentive plan set up in 2004.

The assessor said officials of the firm said they were interested in the program, which is a tax incentive program after they pay the first year. It's a 10 year program. The commissioners agreed they would write a letter to the vice president and ask them to the next meeting to talk about the incentives.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Tim Stallman said the county received a \$164,000 check from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to help pay for repairs to roads damaged in storms this winter. He said he also received checks for six of the seven townships the county maintains roads for and will call about the last check.

The commissioners discussed keeping records of how the money is spent. County Attorney Steve Hirsch suggested putting all of the money in one account. Mr. Stallman said several of the townships have received the checks and set up new bank accounts for the money.

The accounts cannot pay interest, he said, and the money has to be spent in 18 months.




