Eggs are a symbol of rebirth and the spring season. One of the most popular features about Easter is the ever-popular Easter Egg hunt.

Eggs can be decorated in a variety of ways. Egg-dying kits are easy to use. Natural dyes can be made from spices, fruit juice and vegetables. Other decorations can be added, such as sequins, beads, faces and more. Decorating eggs can be a great family activity.

To make hard-cooked eggs, use eggs that are at least a week old. Place in a pan in a single layer and cover with water. Bring them to a boil, cover, and remove from heat. Let the eggs sit for about 15 minutes. Cool the eggs in cold tap water or ice water.

When using hard-cooked eggs for decorating, decide how you will use them after decorating. If you want to eat them, be sure to follow some simple food safety steps:

- Keep your hands clean.

The freshness test that involves

glass of salt water, which many of us grew up using, is not reliable. It has no relationship to the freshness of shell eggs. While eggs do take in air as they age, the size of the air cell varies from egg to egg when laid. Therefore, a freshly-laid egg and an older egg may react in much the same way.
