Welcome to tornado alley

Last year was another record year for tornadoes and we've already had activity this season. Severe thunderstorms have caused millions of dollars in damage to property and crops with wind, hail and torrential rain ..

Even though March is the time set aside to prepare for severe weather, preparations should continue into April. Everyone should know where to go in severe weather.

Families should practice their severe-weather safety plan at home, work, school or other public locations. They should develop a safety plan for times when they are participating in outdoor recreation activities, sporting events or working outdoors.

Having an All Hazards Weather Radio approved by the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Agency is like having a personal tornado siren in your home or vehicle. Every family should consider purchasing a weather radio and programming to receive severe weather warnings and information County, Oct. 26)

If you already have an All Hazards Weather Radio, now is a great time to replace the backup battery in your unit so you will get severe weather information if the power goes out.

'A Meal of Celebration and Remembrance' By the Rev. Heidi M. Wiebe, Evangelical Covenant Church of Oberlin

wonderful times of fellowship and celebration. That is how it has always been in my family – holiday meals, special birthday celebrations, and everyday family dinners. These meals were wonderful opportunities to catch up with one another and remember the milestones in our lives.

Four days after Jesus rode into Jerusalem, he met with his disciples to share such a meal with them. This meal was part of the celebration of Passover, the meal that celebrated how God had redeemed his people out of slavery in Egypt. Each dish they ate and every cup of wine they drank, brought to mind the events of this defining moment in their nation's history.

"Take some of the blood (from the sheep they killed to eat) and put it on the sides and tops of the door frames of the houses. I will pass through was a meal of remembrance. Every time they ate this Egypt. The blood will be a sign for you on the meal in years to come, they would remember how houses where you are, and when I see the blood, I Jesus' blood was shed and how his body was broken will pass over you. I am the Lord." (Exodus so that they would be set free from the slavery of sin. 12:7,12-13)

I have always been of the opinion that meals are he used the elements of the Passover meal to redefine the meaning of the redemption he was bringing to the world, redemption bought with his own blood.

Jesus took the unleavened bread — the bread the Jews ate during Passover to remember how they had to leave Egypt in a hurry – and he gave thanks for the bread and said, "This is my body, broken for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Then Jesus took a cup of wine - one of four cups of wine used during the Passover meal to celebrate the four "I will" promises of God, promises of freedom, deliverance, redemption and thanksgiving - and just as with the bread, Jesus blessed the cup and said, "This cup is my blood, my new covenant with you. Each time you drink this cup, remember me." (I Corinthians 11.23-26
