President's job comes after 15 years of drought

The Oberlin FFA Chapter hasn't years – until now. At the Northwest District FFA Banquet, held on April 19 in Hill City, Kayla Zodrow was elected district president.

The last Oberlin district officer was Cody Richards, who was district reporter in 1993. Previous district officers were Kayla Unger and Dea Macfee in 1988, Marlene Tally in 1987, and Mary Wilson in 1985.

As the district president, Kayla will be responsible for district events and ensuring that the northwest district does their part for state events. She will also teach leadership to greenhands and work with all the chapters in the district.

"My team will depend on me to help them set up our district calendar for next year," Kayla explained. Because Kayla will serve as district president, that means her advisor, Jason Ketterl, will serve as the

district advisor. "I really just wanted slated for an office to continue my leadership," said Kayla. "When I was slated for president, I was in shock but excited. I decided I would like the responsibility to make a great year and influence more people."

To be selected for a district office, a candidate must first have his or her chapter degree. The potential district officer must be a very active member and show strong leadership

An application must be filled out by each candidate, and attached is a contract saying he or she will be a good leader, including staying out of trouble and abstaining from drugs and alcohol. The next step is to be interviewed by a panel that includes the current president and advisor, a state officer, a selected advisor, and members of the community.

"The interviews are nerve-racking, but straight forward questions," she said. "The questions are about

yourself, your chapter, and your involvement in the community. I think had a district officer in almost fifteen there were 14 of us interviewed this

From this group, they pick two people to be slated for the offices of sentinel, reporter, treasurer, and secretary. The top two interviewees are slated for president. The top vote receiver becomes president, and the other vice president.

At the district banquet, each candidate had to give a three-minute speech, and then two delegates from each chapter voted. Prior to voting, the delegates read through the candidates' resumes.

"We will go to a leadership camp this summer," said Kayla, "and work at the state convention and at booths at the state fair. We are also responsible for Greenhand Days, chapter visits, and the district ban-

"My goal as district president is to make chapter visits possible because I think it is important to show chapters all the possibilities they have through the FFA," she continued. "I want to get chapters who aren't very active a boost of confidence so that they can be more ac-


"There are so many skills that a person needs for life that can be obtained from the FFA: record books, livestock judging, ag sales, job interviews, public speaking, horticul-

'My public speaking and interview skills are amazing, thanks to my experiences in the FFA," Kayla explained. "There are also scholarships for those who excel in their organization."

"As far as the FFA, I'm not sure," said Kayla. "FFA has helped me grow as an individual so much, but I'm not sure yet I want to take on a state position."
