to your nymph, streamer or dry fly. • If I am fishing a lake, I use a shooting taper weight forward line which allows the line to travel much further and deeper. That's where the

• If I'm fishing a stream or river, I use double-tapered or weight forward line.

• My preference for a nymph rod length is 7-1/2 to 8-1/2 feet. It should have a fairly stiff action. A more limber rod will take away your ability to work the nymph properly and you'll get fewer detectable strikes. Setting the hook become the main problem with a limber rod.

 Walk soft and stay in the shadows so as not to spook fish. Fish have a lateral line that runs down the side of their body. The lateral line picks up vibrations in the water, so think before you move.

• The biggest problem nymph fisherman have is feeling the strike. It is wise to add a strike indicator to your line. The best that I have found are hunter orange stick-on foam.

• Finally, remember that fish are ambushers. They only have three instincts, eat, spawn and keep from being eaten, so approach banks with the sun in your face, so you don't cast a shadow and scare them. This • Use new sharpened hooks. Be is especially true for brook trout. If the water is cloudy in one area and clear next to it, the fish will hide in the cloudy water to ambush their

> Think to yourself, where would I hide if I were a fish. It will pay off.

> Always wet your hands when handling a fish. Fish have a film mucus on their body to protect them from infection. Once that is broken, fish are more susceptible to disease. Catch and release when possible. A picture is just as good as a kill.

Good luck and keep tight lines.
