Middle school, high school and college students looking for a way to celebrate the beginning of summer need look no further than the New Year's Eve Rewind concert set for Sunday in Colby.
Christian rap artist Jon Reuben will headline the show, with other bands and events beginning at 4 p.m. at the Thomas County Fairgrounds. The gates will open at 3 p.m.
Reuben's concert, along with dozens of other events across Colby, had been scheduled for New Year's Eve but had to be canceled because of a blizzard.
After the snow cleared, party organizers regrouped and rescheduled the festivities for the Memorial Day weekend. Anyone who bought a ticket for the New Year's Eve night can use it to get in Sunday.
In addition to the music, students can try their skills at a climbing wall, have fun with goofy golf, climb on

inflatables, play volleyball, video games and dodge ball and eat.
Reuben takes the stage at 9 p.m. According to his entry on Myspace.com, Reuben's interest in music started at home:
"The son of a Christian Death Metal record label owner and a Messianic Jewish father, John Reuben was raised in a trailer park on a farm that doubled as a church/outreach program for troubled youths. John spent his formative years writing poetry, daydreaming and turning a profit with his older brother on their baseball-card collection.
"All of this played into his love for hip-hop and an entrepreneurial spirit that prompted him to leave high school early to focus on his musical pursuits. By the age of 18, he had started his own "indie" record label, and released several albums recorded by him and other artists. He also ran a hip-hop night with his

brother at a club on the Ohio State campus.
"Just before his 19th birthday, John packed up his recording gear and moved to Hollywood, where he survived by doing extra work for movies and television. If you look close enough, you can see him in such classics as 'Rocky and Bullwinkle,' 'Buffy the Vampire Slayer,' 'Melrose Place' and 'Clueless.'" Reuben returned to school to acquire his General Equivalency Degree.
Other bands that will take the stage include RPM, Afterthought, Exclusive to None, Fight the Good Fight, Blood to Avail, Mitch Herman and Mark Phillips. Burlington, Colo., teacher and youth leader Jon Reverts will speak.

Sappa Park gets sign, mower


Anyone driving east on U.S. 36 by Sappa Park has noticed the new black, red and white sign at the entrance to the recreation area.
The Decatur Tomorrow Sappa Park Committee, said co-convenor Carolyn Burtis, held a barbecue fund raiser and gathered donations to help pay for the sign.
The committee also was been able to purchase a Bush Hog mower to clear trails at the park, using a donation from a defunct highway organization. Mrs. Burtis said they are borrowing a four-wheeler to pull the mower until the committee can afford one.
The vinyl sign, which lists camp-

ing, the picnic area, shelter house, nature trails and disc golf course as park attractions, was put over the existing board by Koch Systems, a new business in Oberlin.
Mrs. Burtis said they are still raising money for the park, including \$40,000 for a wetlands. The Oberlin-Decatur County Economic De-

velopment Corp. has received \$1,000 for the project so far, she said, and anyone wanting to donate can send a check to the development office or the chamber office in the Business Enhancement Entrepreneurial Center.

Stockmen request open range

The Decatur County commissioners received a request last Tuesday from two stockmen in Olive Township to run cattle on open range.
County Attorney Steve Hirsch said the request from Paul and Danyne Uehlin could be handled in a similar process to closing a road. Landowners in the area will be notified, as well as the township board, he said, and County Clerk Marilyn Horn will prepare a resolution. The commissioners will then hold a hearing on the changes.
The road won't have to be turned into a minimum maintenance or closed; it can still be maintained every day, said Tim Stallman, road and bridge supervisor.
