125 YEARS AGO – June 1882

The school taught by Miss Ada Penny reports water about one foot deep during a late storm, those of the pupils unable to swim being compelled to take refuge on the benches. School directors should either have the schoolhouses made waterproof or supply the teachers and pupils with life preservers.

Efforts are being made to establish a post office on Hazzard draw on the Oberlin and Achilles mail route.

Four families of Hungarians, consisting of 16 persons, arrived in Oberlin directly from the old country last Thursday in search of free homes in Kansas. They will locate in the Hungarian settlement in the west part of the county.

E. Leflang passed through town yesterday with a herd of 7,000 Mexican sheep. I.L. Peck of Shibboleth purchased 400 and Ed Martin, of this place, also bought 367 head.

Frank Hunt has been busily engaged lately erecting a first-class sod house on his claim two miles southeast of town.

100 YEARS AGO - June 1907

On Saturday morning there was not enough water in the standpipe to have been of any avail had there happened to be a fire to break out. What is to be done for water is now the burning question for the people of Oberlin.

75 YEARS AGO — June 1932

Temple to be dedicated June 20 has been called by visitors 'the most architecture is what is known as Modern American with reinforced concrete columns, beams, girders and joists. The exterior is the best grade buff brick with terra cotta trim which perfects the architecture of the building and makes one of the handsomest buildings for its size and cost you will find in a number of states. The building is more modern and has more modern conveniences than any other building of

its size in this section of Kansas. The city office is now located in the ground floor of the Masonic Temple and offers spacious office and storage rooms for City Superintendent Ralph Hurst and his assistant, Gale Ridgway. The pleasant lady in the front office, who takes your money and makes you like it, is Miss Jenne Barnard.

This issue contains a history writ-McKague family who were originally from Canada and came to Decatur County in 1881 and built a sod house on a homestead 12 miles northeast of Oberlin. In later years the McKagues sold three quarters of land and moved to Portland, Ore., but the father, S.R. McKague became so sick for Decatur County that they returned in less than a month and made their home on Beaver Creek between Cedar Bluffs and Traer.

The new temple stands as a monument to a pioneer family whose lives were devoted never selfishly to personal comfort but ever to the welfare of others. Through the loyalty and generosity of Miss Theresa "Tete" McKague, lifetime heir to the estate of her brother, the new Masonic Temple is now ready to dedicate.
