When one realizes that their child has mastered an art, a warm feeling reaches the deepest part of the body. Now I realize that they have developed into masters of the shooting line.

They have mastered their craft and could catch grayling after grayling. I realized that the torch has been passed on to another genera-

Roll cast after roll cast landed gently along the weedy shoreline of this high lake. Working like a perfectly timed machine, my oldest son Matt looked at me with a puzzled face.

"Hey, old man, it's OK, just relax and watch a master at work," he said. As I watched, wading in waisthigh water while surveying the bank, it was possible to see dark shapes darting from the deep to shallow water, chasing both son's scud patterns.

As I watched, I realized fishing was not the same as it used to be. Yes, I caught my share of fish that

With a chuckle, I watched both of them release the most beautiful fish of them all, the grayling. And I realized that the fiberglass grayling on my wall is just a reminder of what fishing and family is all about.

My Canadian grayling, which just missed breaking into the record books by three ounces in 1989, kindled the flame.

Now I have passed to my sons the art form that started generations ago in England.
