Clarence Kirby, district manager of Halliburton Services, Hays office, noted this week that nine employees at the Oberlin camp were advised of layoffs last Thursday. The number of drilling rigs operating in the state, usually considered an indication of the rate of oil and gas exploration, has dropped from 223 in mid-January to 170 in July. Prices for Kansas crude oil have dropped from \$36 a barrel in mid-November of 1981 to \$30.

Another local business reflecting the current position of the oil industry is West Central Manufacturing which constructs mobile geological laboratories. Kenneth Burrus said that as of June 28 the biggest share of the crew had been laid off on temporary basis. A total of 17 persons had been employed by the local firm
