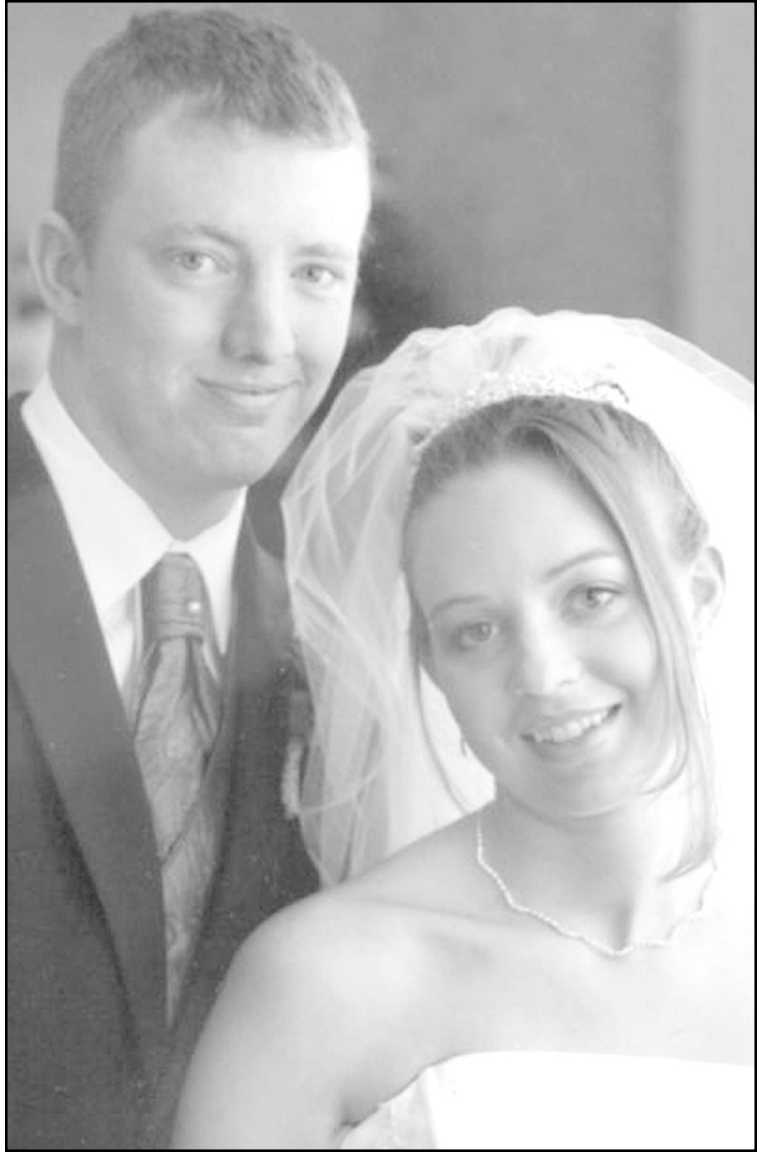

Lora Marietta graduated from Army Airborne School in Fort Benning, Ga., on Friday.

During the graduation, there was a ceremony for second- and third-generation Airborne graduates to have their wings pinned on by their fathers or grandfathers. Her wings were pinned on by her father, Alan Marietta, a former Airborne Ranger.

The three-week Airborne training consisted of a ground week, tower week, and jump week. The training for ground and tower week included physical training, how to properly land and exit the aircraft using the 34-foot tower, 250-foot tower, swing landing trainer, and the suspended harness. During jump week, she completed five jumps out of a C-130 and C-17 jet aircraft, including

one night jump and two fully-equipped combat jumps.

She will be a sophomore at Kansas State University, where she is majoring in dietetics and is in the Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps. Her parents, Alan and Judith Marietta of Oberlin, attended her graduation.

Miss Marietta is a Delbert Townsend Scholar and Col. Townsend, a graduate of Decatur Community

High School, said that he also was a member of ROTC at Kansas State University.

After graduating in 1942, he went into the 17th Airborne Division, a World War II unit. He attended Officer's Candidate School at Fort Benning, then was commissioned as a second lieutenant.
