"Many a person thinks he has God and everything he needs when he has money and property; in them he trusts and of them he boasts so stubbornly and securely that he cares for no one. Surely such a man also has a god — mammon by name, that is, money and possessions - on which he fixes his whole heart. It is the most common idol on earth. He who has money and property feels secure, happy, fearless, as if he were sitting in the midst of paradise.

On the other hand, he who has nothing doubts and despairs as if he never heard of God. Very few there are who are cheerful, who do not fret and complain, if they do not have mammon. This desire for wealth clings and cleaves to our nature all the way to the grave.

proud people become because of such possessions, ing. and how despondent when they lack them or are deprived of them. Therefore, I repeat, to have a God heart can trust completely.

The world we live in today is not that much dif-properly means to have something in which the heart trusts completely."

Our world is full of empty idols to which we cling. but we do have other gods to which we bow down. If you doubt me, ask yourself what things you cannot live without.
