helping the ambulance crew use advanced life support during transports, Decatur County commissioners heard.

Ambulance Director Linda Manning told commissioners at their meeting July 17 that Suzanne Harms can monitor intravenous transfusions with medication while patients are transported to other hospitals. The regular emergency medical crews can only monitor transfusions with normal saline or the like, she said, and they can't start the injections.

Ms. Harms has a temporary permit to work on the ambulance, Ms. Manning said, but will be taking the emergency medical technician course when it starts in September.

Although she was gone when a tabletop emergency exercise was conducted earlier this month, Ms. Manning said she'd been told that it went well by Commissioner Ralph Unger, who took part.

The exercise simulated response to a bus overturned on U.S. 83 in a snowstorm and multiple casualties being brought to the hospital in ambulance driving behind road graders

Not everything worked perfectly, Mr. Unger said. During the exercise, they needed people to step forward and take command, he said.

To keep people on their toes, those running the exercise would throw in new problems, such as all telephone land lines going out.

"There were problems, but mostly everyone did well," he said. Some of the kinks they threw in absolutely could happen."

"Now we know what we need to work on," added Commissioner Doyle Brown.

Mr. Unger asked Ms. Manning to talk to her crews and see what they would change in how they handled the exercise.

In other business, the commissioners:

· Learned that the Kansas Department of Transportation grant for the county transit bus has been approved through June. The grant usually comes through in February, said most electronic and computer e-County Clerk Marilyn Horn, and she had no explanation as to why it was so late this year.

• Asked Jeff Younger of Seminole Energy Services out of Hays to lock

"I would go with 40 to 60 percent," he told commissioners by conference call. "I wouldn't lock in 100 percent. If we don't get any weather, the price will come down."

• Discussed extending electric lines from Wheat Ridge Retirement Apartments to the horse arena at the fairground to get lights and power at that facility.

• Decided to ask for a certificate of liability insurance from the Tripple Creek Riders, which is leasing the horse arena from the county.

• Signed a letter of support for an "e-waste" facility for computers and other electronic gear in Colby through Northwest Kansas Recycling for a grant from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment

The grant would cover Decatur, Sheridan, Rawlins, Cheyenne, Logan, Thomas and Gove counties, Mrs. Horn said, and would cover quipment.
