County looks for pickup

The Decatur County commissioners asked the noxious weed director to send out a specification sheet for new or used pickups to haul the recycling trailer to Colby at their meeting last Tuesday.

Director Gaylen Huntley said he had found one, but it had been sold. He said he would send out the sheets, although he doesn't have the money in his budget. The vehicle would be used for both recycling and the weed department.

The commissioners asked him to go ahead and get bids and have them sent to the county clerk's office by Monday, Aug. 27.

Clerk Marilyn Horn said she is looking for some grant money since the vehicle will be used for recycling as well as weed spraying.

When the recycling building gets going, said Mrs. Horn, a truck from Colby will come to pick up the items. The plan after that, said Mr. Huntley, is to take the trailer to Jennings, Norcatur and Dresden on a rotating schedule so people in those areas can use it without having to drive to Oberlin.

Mr. Huntley said the county transit bus has new tires and will be serviced this week. The part needed to fix the ramp is on the way, he added.

The commissioners ratified a purchase of \$800 for 50 gallons of the weed killer 2,4-D. Mr. Huntley said he has already sold 40 gallons to landowners.

He said he had sprayed along the highway for spotted napweed, which is a highly noxious weed. Mr. Huntley said he wanted the commissioners to know that the weed is in the county.


In other business, the commissioners

The position formerly held by Bert Cool, a dispatcher and longtime sheriff's deputy, was adverthree applicants. Mr. Cool served in the position part-time. A year ago in January 2006, Patti Skubal, a parttime deputy, was hired as his assistant. Mr. Cool resigned, said County Clerk Marilyn Horn, but continues as a part-time dispatcher. A former Kansas City, Mo., police detective, he came to Decatur County as undersheriff in 1985.

After a recess for lunch, the commissioners met with Mrs. Skubal about the position. She said although she still needs more training, she feels comfortable about doing the job.

She said she has talked with Sheriff Ken Badsky about continuing to work part-time for the sheriff's office, helping with vehicle inspections and other work.

The commissioners offered Mrs. Skubal \$26,000 a year for the director's job, which will now be fulltime. Two-thirds of her salary will be paid from the general budget and one-third from the sheriff's budget.

Commissioner Ralph Unger said she needed to remember that emergency management will be her top priority, with the sheriff's office duties being secondary.

She said that working with the local emergency planning committee, she coordinates response efforts and exercises dealing with emergency plans and procedures.

Mrs. Skubal said she is also part of an incident management team for the state with deals which responds to any declared disaster in Kansas.

As the director, she said, her goal is to try to bring all agencies in the county together to come up with an emergency operation plan that will work. There is a plan, she said, but Mrs. Skubal agreed to the salary, it is from 1991, and they are work-


