75 YEARS AGO — August 1932

Some person, or persons, apparently without anything else to do but destroy and waste, broke heavy dozen or more gasoline and kerosene storage tanks located in southeast Oberlin with Kent Oil losing 36 to 37 thousand gallons; K.T., 19,000 gallons; and Home Oil, 9,000 gallons. Efforts had been made to open storage tanks at Sinclair and Standard but failed. Gasoline was 18 inches deep in the ditch 200 yards north of the tank area. The cutoff road leading past

the tanks was immediately closed to traffic in an effort to prevent the 50 YEARS AGO — August 1957 starting of a fire. No clues were found except fingerprints.

L.O. Garrett, 35, of Sappa Township, was fatally injured and Frank Garver severely injured when their car collided with a Chevrolet truck loaded with 5 tons of groceries 9 miles west of Hastings, Nebr., on U.S. Highway 6. Mr. Garrett was taking Frank to Hastings after he received a phone call that Mrs. Garver, who was recovering from a mastoid operation, was in very serious condition and that he should come. The cause of the accident will probably never be known but it was a very dark night and a storm was coming up when the car and truck met head-on. Mr. Garver was driving at the time of the accident. Mr. Garrett is survived by his wife, Gussie, and two children, a boy and
