in fear because we are constantly threatened by the news of terrorism. We need to find some coolness

I have exhorted you to find a proper place to experience God's presence and to refresh yourselves before we begin a new school year. Here I would like to touch a little bit on prayer, which may strengthen you and cool your spirit.

Muslims pray five times a day. Before sunrise, the first call to prayer from the minaret awakens the faithful with the words: "Prayer is better than sleep." We need to learn something good from

But then Jesus tells us, "Pray always." (Luke 18:1) Not just five times a day. Always. Not just before meals or a final exam. Always.

In fact, we do pray, but not always. Few Christians, either Catholic or Protestant, say grace before meals these days, and fewer still say grace after a meal. If hunger inspires us to pray, then full ing dinner, seem to induce nothing more than a us. Lovers understand.

Even we who are not involved in warfare huddle catatonic state cured only by a nap or televised football game — itself a source of desperate prayer.

> Praying requires a constant awareness of the presence of God. It means praying while stuck in traffic no less than when lighting a candle in a quiet church. It means inviting God into the mundane aspects of our lives, like brushing our teeth or doing dishes.

> Perhaps it's hardest to pray when we are tired or cranky or simply too busy. But prayer need not be elaborate or time consuming. It need not even involve words, for God surely knows our needs.

Prayer is for us. As a prayer states, "You have no need of our praise, but our desire to pray is itself your gift and makes us grow in your grace."

Prayer becomes a joy and it cools our souls when we are content simply to be with God. Silence can be prayer and can communicate ways not possible with

At that point, we no longer need to be told to "Pray always." From our first waking moment until our falling asleep at night, exult and thrive and become more stomachs, especially after a wonderful Thanksgiv- alive by being with the One who means everything to


