Science curriculum discussed

The Oberlin School Board heard information last Monday about a new science curriculum that will be presented at the September meeting.

Elementary Principal Duane Dorshorst, head of the district curriculum committee, said the science curriculum is unique because there are more state standards for science than in other areas.

The new curriculum means the kids will learn different things at different grade levels than they have in the past, he said. The changes meant some realignment of where things are taught because they are tested by the state at different levels. This year, the district will order new science books and materials to be in place for next year. Starting this year, he said, stu-

dents will be tested in the fourth and seventh grades and at each level in high school. This way, Mr. Dorshorst said, the students will have learned what they need to know by the time they take the state Mr. Dorshorst said he worked

with a committee including one teacher from each level at the grade school and all of the science teachers at the high school to write the He said it has been a struggle to
