Gymnasts to use arena at Gateway with no cost

The Oberlin City council Thursday agreed to give the Creative Movements Gymnastics permission to use The Gateway arena free of charge for Tuesday classes.

The agreement between the city and the gymnasts allows the kids to use the arena for classes from 4 to 7:15 p.m. on Tuesdays unless another event is scheduled for that day. If that happens, the council agreed, the gymnasts could try to have the classes on Wednesday.

Coach Robyn Rouse said she talked to the board and the group could pay as much as \$600 a year for The Gateway. She had told the council that they could pay \$400 a year at a previous meeting.

Would that mean raising the fees for the kids? asked Councilwoman Rhonda May. No. said Mrs. Rouse. if the club didn't have the money, they would need to have a fund

She said they would prefer the arena on Tuesdays starting at 4 p.m. and lasting three hours and 15 min-

Councilman Jay Anderson said he was still a little worried about the idea because the gymnasts could get bumped. What if the city doesn't charge with the idea that if a paying customer wants the arena for that day, the gymnasts don't get to use it. What would the club spend the

money on if they didn't pay for the arena? he asked. Mrs. Rouse said they would use


