A light lunch is being planned, and the ever-popular door prizes will be a big part of the Wellness Fair. One of the very popular providers at the fair is the Sheridan County Health Complex lab. Technicians will be ready to draw your blood to get various types of information for you. Blood draws will include the chemistry panel, the lipid panel, and the hemagram for \$25; a PSA screen for \$20; a TSH (thyroid) screen for \$15; and a C-reactive protein screen

Participants will be asked to fast for 12-14 hours minimum for the lipid, chemistry and hemagram panels. Fasting is not necessary for other tests.

#### "Why did Jesus die? - The partition of sin" By Pastor Doug Hasty - Oberlin and Prairie Chapel **United Methodist churches**

For the last three weeks I have used this space to try Corinthians 5:19). and answer the question, "Why did Jesus die?"

I have explained it in terms of God's great love for you and me, and the problem of sin. Isaiah 53:6: "We to his own way; and the LORD has laid on him the life: it is eternal. iniquity of us all." This verse claims that everyone has chosen to ignore God and go our own way.

We have rebelled against God and His ways, but our sins have been laid on the Messiah, God's anointed One, His only Son. I have stated that the Scriptures talk about sin in four ways: the Pollution of Sin, the Power of Sin, the Penalty for Sin, and today I want to talk about the Partition of Sin.

On a smaller scale we can see the partition of sin at work in a family. Two siblings get in a fight and they go two days without speaking a word to each other – there is an unseen barrier between them. Their relationship has been harmed until they seek some kind of reconciliation.

In the same way the partition or separation is there when you sin; it begins now. The prophet Isaiah proclaimed, "Surely the arm of the Lord is not too short to save, nor his ear too dull to hear. But your iniquities have separated you from God; your sins have hidden his face from you, so he will not hear" (Isaiah 59:1-2). The things we do wrong cause this barrier.

The partition of sin has been destroyed. What happened to the prodigal son can happen to us. We can come back to the Father and experience love and joy all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned and blessings. The relationship is not only for this

Let me try to illustrate what God does for us through Jesus Christ. Let's say I am standing in front of you and hold out my right hand with my palm turned upward. My open palm represents you and me all our family and friends. But because of sin there is a barrier over us that blocks our relationship with God. Let's say that barrier is represented by a book I would then place on my right hand. The book is a record of all our sins. Then I put out my left hand with my palm turned

upward and say that it represents Jesus. When Jesus went to the cross, he removed the book of sin that was a barrier for you and me and placed it upon himself. Because the barrier has been removed from my right hand, you and I have free access to God, and there is now therefore no condemnation. We are free.

Now because Jesus lived a perfect life and never sinned, his sacrifice pays the penalty for our sin, and He rises to new life in the resurrection and there is no separation between Him and the Father. Everyone can be reconciled to God, if we accept his free gift.


