## **Runners** advance to the state meet on Saturday

Decatur Community High's Andrew Richards and Tamara Ketterl will represent the Red Devils at the 2A state cross country meet in Wamego at 9 a.m. Saturday.

Richards led the boy Red Devils, finishing fourth at the 2A regional meet in Hill City Saturday with a time of 18 minutes, 51 seconds on the five-kilometer or 3.106856mile course, receiving a medal.

Ketterl also received a medal with her 10th-place finish on the four kilometer or 2.4854848-mile course with a time of 18:07

# **Beloit Trojans down Devils**

**By JIM MERRIOTT** jtmerriott@nwkansas.com The Beloit High School football squad blew away Oberlin Friday night 50-12 in the second round of district play.

The Trojans were by no means spectacular, but their effective offensive attack racked up 452 total yards, mostly on the ground, at Smick Field.

Thursday, Beloit will tackle Phillipsburg, who lost to Norton Friday 12-6 during the district playoffs.

Beloit improved to 1-1 in district play and 6-2 for the season.

Oberlin dropped to 0-2 in district play and 2-6 for the season. Thursday night the Red Devils will travel to Norton with hopes of knocking off the Bluejays and finishing the season on a winning note.

Oberlin continued to struggle with penalties. The Red Devils committed six penalties for 45 yards.

Turnovers also killed the Red Devils as they fumbled twice, losing both. They also threw one interception.

The Red Devils spotted Beloit a 44-0 halftime lead causing a running clock in the second half. The Trojans scored once more in the third quarter running the score to 50-0 before the Red Devils scored twice in the fourth quarter with their last score coming as time ran out.

The Oberlin offense remained in first gear. Red Devil runners could only muster 95 yards on 33 carries.

Passing, the Red Devils were five for 13 for 69 yards and one interception. Oberlin made 11 first downs, five rushing, four passing and two by penalties.

Beloit scored on their first six of seven possessions, controlling the clock with smashmouth up the middle runs on offense.

The Trojans pounded and pounded the ball on the ground either grinding out first downs or touchdowns.

The Trojans ran 39 plays for 452 yards; the Red Devils ran 49 plays for 157 yards of total offense.

Beloit scored their first touchdown with 7 minutes, 14 seconds left in the first quarter, going 53

yards on eight plays using 3 minutes and 15 seconds on the drive when Cas Spangler, 5'9" and 155 pounds, scored on a two-yard run making the score 6-0. The two-

point conversion failed. Spangler rushed for a game high 176 yards on 10 carries and two touchdowns.

The Trojans scored their second touchdown with 4:47 left in the first quarter on a three-play drive, covering 86 yards in just 47 seconds when Spangler broke for a 69-yard touchdown romp making the score 12-0. The two-point conversion failed.

Beloit scored again after a Red Devil fumble occurred in the first quarter with 56 seconds left when

Cole Kruse hit Grant Brown for a 10-yard touchdown pass. The twopoint conversion was good.

The Trojans found paydirt again in the second quarter when Kruse hit Brown on an eight-yard touchdown pass at 9:36. Jase Sporleder ran in the two-point conversion making the score 28-0.

With 5:35 until half-time, Sporleder scored the Trojans' fifth touchdown on a 53-yard run. Beloit used just three plays, covering 73 yards in 63 seconds. Senior lineman Luke Deneke ran in the two-point conversion running the score to 36-0.

The Trojans' final touchdown of the first half came at 2:24 when Spangler scored on an 11-yard run

covering 44 yards, using four plays. Sporleder ran in the two-point conversion making the score 44-0 at halftime.

Oberlin scored their two touchdowns in the fourth quarter.

Lucas Juenemann scored on a 10-yard run. Dakota Soderlund's extra-point kick was blocked, making the score 50-6.

Red Devil senior Royal Fisher scored the last touchdown of the game and his first rushing of the season with 28 seconds left in the game on a seven-yard run ending scoring.

The Oberlin two-point conversion was intercepted on the last play of the game with the final score Beloit 50, Oberlin 12.

Rushing, Juenemann carried the ball 11 times for 26 yards and a touchdown. Jacob Fortin carried nine times for 25 yards; Sam Stapp, seven times for 25 yards; Logan Fortin, one time for two yards; Fisher, one time for seven yards and a touchdown; Toby Peters, three times for eight yards; and Chad Williams carried one time for eight yards.

J. Fortin was five for 13 for 69 yards and one interception in the air.

Receiving, L. Fortin caught two passes for 32 yards; Stapp, two catches for 30 yards; and T. Peters, one catch for seven yards.

On defense, Dakota Soderland was top tackler with eight; Wiley Farr finished with seven tackles; and Everett Urban, six.

"We were definitely disappointed with our effort on Friday night," said Coach Trevor Williams. "As the head coach, it is my job to have the team prepared and ready to play. We were not ready and we came out flat from the beginning. Beloit completely controlled the game.

"Thursday will be a great challenge for us to end the season. Norton is having a very good year and will be playing a game that will decide first or second for them in district play. We will have to be prepared and inspired to play a  $\oplus$ great game," Williams said.

The Red Devils travel to Norton Thursday for their final game of the season. Game time is 7 p.m.

Johnson-Stanton won the boys division with a team score of 81 followed by Osborne, 90 points, and Leoti-Wichita County, 92.

Other boys division scores were: Hill City, 103; Syracuse, 125; Wa-Keeney-Trego Community, 139; Minneapolis, 139; Oberlin, 152; Ellis, 180; and Stockton, 234.

Atwood, the number two seed, defeated the Decatur Community High Lady Red Devils (17-18), the number five seed, in straight sets 25-22 and 25-18 in the single-elimination championship final here in Oberlin Saturday in a sultry, warm gymnasium. The Lady Red Devils received the runner-up trophy for their efforts.

Both teams battled worthy opponents during the all-day tournament to face each other in the final deciding match.

Oberlin advanced to the semifinals by knocking off the number four seed Ellis Railroaders (18-10) in straight sets 25-11 and 25-19 in the first round in the top bracket of the tournament.

The Lady Red Devils began to build momentum when they knocked off the number one seed Hill City Lady Ringnecks (32-6) in straight sets 25-20 and 25-18 in the semifinal round to advance to the finals.

The Lady Buffaloes of Atwood defeated the Stockton Lady Tigers (6-21), the seventh seed, in the first round of the lower bracket in straight sets 25-22 and 25-15, advancing to the second round. There they defeated the Oakley Lady Plainsmen (14-20), the sixth seed, in straight sets 25-22 and 25-18 to advance to the finals to face the determined Lady Red Devils.

In first-round results, Hill City defeated the Plainville Lady Cardinals (5-23), the eighth seed, in straight sets 25-12 and 25-8.

Oberlin defeated Ellis; Atwood

defeated Stockton; and Oakley defeated the WaKeeney/Trego Community Lady Golden Eagles (22-12), the third-seeded team, in straight sets 25-19 and 25-20.

Against Ellis, Lacey Ream was top server and top passer.

Ream was 8 for 8 serving with two aces. Passing she was 6 for 7 with four perfect.

Jordon Dreher was top setter going 17 for 17 with six perfect.

LeAnna Sheaffer was top hitter and top blocker.

Olson, 44, will move to the head coaching position Greg Olson after working last year as


the assistant coach under Rusty Montgomery. Montgomery left the position to work in the private sector. This is Olson's first head coaching position.
