School district adopts policy on bullying here

begun taking a stand against bullying in the schools, first with adopting a policy against the practice and scheduling training on the subject.

The Oberlin School Board approved a policy against bullying in schools at their September meeting. The policy, said Superintendent Pat Cullen, is required by a state law.

"It requires school district boards to adopt policies prohibiting bullying on school property, in school vehicles or at school sponsored activities," he said. "The bill also requires each school district to adopt and implement a strategic plan to address bullying, which must include provision for training and education of staff and students."

The Oberlin School District has day because people are picking on them, said Dr. Cullen. Those students often feel isolated.

> The district wants to keep up the quality of our schools, he said, and part of that is keeping bullying out of the schools.

On Monday, Dec. 3, he said, the staff will have a full day of training on bullying by the Southwest Kansas Educational Service Center from Sublette. At the training, said Dr. Cullen, teachers and staff will learn how bullying impacts people, especially kids, and what they can do about it. He said they will also learn ways to identify bullying.

The following day, the students will get training about bullying and what it is and what to do if it is happening to them or someone they know.




