# School steps to be checked, patched

The Oberlin School Board agreed electrical work for \$13,000 and new last Monday to have a contractor look at the high school's front entrance and patch the steps while the board decides how to remodel the area.

Superintendent Pat Cullen said he talked with architects from Joseph R. Hewgly and Associates Inc., out of North Platte, Neb.

The plans from the firm included cleaning the brick and stone facade for \$153,000, putting in a new plaza and electric mat heating for \$74,000,

ramps, railings and sidewalk at \$10,000. The total project would cost \$250,000.

The firm said it would charge 11.5 percent, or \$28,750 for plans.

Dr. Cullen said brick could not use a water heating system underneath to slow ice and snow. He said it might be better to go with another material and have it stamped to look like bricks. None of this will be done until at least spring, he added.

What about a temporary patch on

the steps until then? asked Board Member Monte Moore. Nothing has been done, said Dr. Cullen, but there could be a temporary job done if that's what the board wants.

There is one bad step that needs to have something done to it, said board member Barb Olson.

One light was moved away from a tree so that the area is a little brighter, said Dr. Cullen. He said he will have a patch done and ask contractor John Nelson to the December meeting to talk about the job.
