Taste 3: It's mid-afternoon and I still haven't eaten lunch. I need to pick up a few things at the grocery store before I swing through a fast-food place for a quick bite. The grocery store is offering food samples. I'll just eat a little cracker with spread to tide me over.

About calories: 40 Taste 4: The fast-food place is

Taste 5: Still a couple of hours to go at work before I head to that holiday dinner tonight. I think I'll check out the break room to see if any more goodies have shown up ... chocolate-covered cherries! Chocolate is good for you, right? I'll just have one.

About calories: 60

Taste 6: It's a great dinner party, but maybe I shouldn't stand near the snack table before the meal starts. I'm now dipping my third chip. About calories: 75

Taste 7: Who can pass up oldfashioned eggnog? I'll just have a half-cup.

About calories: 200

Taste 8: There are just a couple of tablespoons of candied sweet potatoes left. Someone should enjoy them – it might as well be me! Approximate calories: 60
