Crop and livestock loss programs are available

Diane Barrett, executive director est loss on all crops, she said. of the Decatur County office of the U.S. Farm Service Agency, reminds tive Program can provide money to farmers that several programs could owners and contract growers for help those who have had crop or livestock deaths between Jan. 1, livestock losses in the last three 2005, and Dec. 31, 2007, in desig-

The Crop Disaster Program can provide benefits to farmers who suffered losses for 2005, 2006 or 2007 crops, she said. Losses from natural disasters may qualify for financial help if the crop was planted before and would have been harvested by Dec. 31. This has been changed from the previous date of Feb. 28, 2007, she added.

Only farmers who had crop insurance or coverage under the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program are eligible. These losses must be in excess of 35 percent, and farmers can receive benefits only for the year in which they had the greatThe 2005-2007 Livestock Incen-

nated counties, she said, adding that drought is not an eligible disaster event under this program.

Farmers who think they could qualify for any program should call the office or stop by, she said.

The agency also is taking 2008 wheat acreage reports in preparation for the beginning of the new farm program, she said. Although the 2008 farm bill has not been approved by Congress, farmers can still report their planted acreage of wheat, oats, barley and alfalfa.


