Events of Yesteryear

125 YEARS AGO — Jan. 1883

The Oberlin House is being run in metropolitan style.

We would advise citizens to have extensions put on their thermometer before the cold spell visits us.

The dance at the residence of C.E. Thomas on Tuesday evening, Jan. 16, was well attended.

S.F. Colby, Geo. Miller, C.C. Bradshaw, John Luttrell, Harold Neep, Sam and Bill Wilson who started for Lenora on Wednesday after lumber, came back Monday. Sam Wilson broke an axle, but succeeded in procuring another wagon; John Luttrell broke a wagon tire and left his load about 14 miles from town. Bill Wilson broke a bolster of his wagon but managed to bring his load in with it. Bradshaw, Luttrell, Neep and Sam Wilson each froze their feet more or less and Miller's nose was slightly frost-bitten. All together they report a very pleasant time, and say the delay was caused by Miller and Colby persisting in trying to figure the profits of the trip.

The thermometer of J.W. Allen and Son at 8 a.m. was 27 degrees below zero.

100 YEARS AGO — Jan. 1908

A new company with \$5,000 capital was formed last week with the following corps of directors: Charles E. Reed of Norton, W.G. Riste, Roy E. Barr, Frances E. Barr and Joseph H. Young of Oberlin.

Irwin Cook is carrying the mail on two routes with his automobile and he makes the two trips in less than a half day, which is going some.

John Love was hauling out corn last week for his spring use.

Frank Van Vleet and son Emery were Oberlin visitors Monday. Both claimed they were paying out all the money they had made in the last three years in buying corn to keep their hogs and horses from starving.

The big wolf hunt west of town was attended by 350 men and boys. Six wolves were killed by the crowd and another took refuge in the Battin barn and was killed by the women folk with an ax.

75 YEARS AGO — Jan. 1933

For the past two or three weeks rumors have been rampant in connection with the Tom McKay murder mystery the nite of August 31, last, with names of a number of Decatur County people mentioned as possible or probable suspects. An interview with local officers, however, indicates that while some of the reports might prove to have some foundation none has as yet revealed anything definite or incriminating.

Miss Goldie Profit has been hired to fill the vacancy in the English department. She taught in the Dodge City schools and then in the training department of the Hays Teachers College.

50 YEARS AGO — Jan. 1958

Decatur County got its first measurable moisture of 1958 and second fairly large snow of the season this week.

A postal department ruling that all cuspidors — that's a spittoon to the uninhibited — shall be removed from Post Office lobbies by Feb. 1 will have little effect here. Postmaster Gladys Miesner says the Oberlin Post Office doesn't have one and hasn't had once since she became postmaster in 1951. Apparently no one has missed it. Which is more than can be said when there was one there, we'll bet.
