

Council OKs lease on farm ground

The Oberlin City Council approved a three year lease with an Oberlin man for the farm ground around the Oberlin airport north of town at a meeting Thursday,

City Administrator Gary Shike said most of the ground is on the south side of the airport and east of the runway.

Mayor Joe Stanley said the city sent Greg Lohoefener the lease and he signed it and sent it back.

The lease is done every three years, said Mr. Shike. The only thing that changed from previous years is that the city added a clause to let either party out of the lease before the three years are up just in case.

The council approved the lease, with Mr. Lohoefener paying \$100 a year and also agreeing to continue mowing around the hangars and

County raises hourly pay for volunteers

sioners approved increasing rates to \$20 a call for fire department volunteers and for local calls for the ambulance service at the meeting last Tuesday.

At a previous meeting, Ambulance Director Linda Manning asked about increasing the pay rates for volunteers on the service, but the commissioners wanted to check into the reimbursement rate for the fire department volunteers first.

Fire Chief Bill Cathcart said he can put the fire calls on the pay sheets, but was told in the past that he didn't need to. Chief Cathcart said he has all of the runs and meetings that the volunteers get paid for in his records.

Currently, he said, the firefighters receive \$15 a call and for each meeting. The meetings, he said, may last a couple hours when they do training and go over the fires.

The commissioners asked about advertising for more volunteers for the fire department. Chief Cathcart said word of mouth seems to be working pretty well. When the department gets new volunteers, he said, it does cost to get them outfitted with gear. Chief Cathcart said he tries to keep as many volunteers for the gear he has.

The commissioners approved the increase to \$20 per person for as the other department heads.

The commissioners also changed the rate for a local emergency call from \$290 to \$300 per call. This is the rate the user would pay.

The group did talk about the National Incident Management Training for Chief Cathcart with **Emergency Management Director** Patti Skubal.

Mrs. Skubal said there are new objectives which will affect the fire department. In order to stay in compliance, she said, Chief Cathcart has to get the training.

Chief Cathcart said he hasn't been able to attend because it cuts into his trash hauling schedule. He said he thinks he needs to have some compensation or help to cover his regular job while he attends the training.

The two discussed fire calls and who is in charge. Commissioner Doyle Brown said Chief Cathcart should remember he is in command during a fire call. Chief Cathcart said Mrs. Skubal is the emergency management director and should report back to the commissioners on situations.

She said she is working on scheduling a local emergency preparedness committee meeting and hopes Chief Cathcart will be there as well

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Clinic plans open house

sneak a peek at the new speciality clinic at the Decatur County Hospital will get a chance to do so on Sunday, Feb. 10 during the open house sponsored by the hospital.

Administrator Lynn Doeden said the open house starts at 1:30 p.m. with everyone invited to come walk around the speciality clinic and see the hospital's newest addition. They will serve cookies, coffee and tea.

The clinic includes a check-indesk, stress test room, procedure room, restrooms, storage areas, two exam rooms and offices. It was built this past year to provide a place for traveling doctors, or speciality clinics to have a place to see patients. Currently the hospital has speciality clinics in four areas including cardiology, urology, oncology and ophthalmology, which helps patients so they do not have

The new clinic cost \$800,000 to build with \$150,000 coming from the hospital board and \$650,000 from the United States Department of Agriculture as a loan. Although
