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Is Your Plate too Full?

Have you ever felt as though God has put too much on your plate for you to handle? You're all stressed out and there's no end in sight.

Maybe you feel as though you've had more than your fair share of troubles, and maybe it's time for all of that bad karma to get spread around to someone

Trust me, we all feel that way at some time in our lives. But I'd like to offer you a story that was emailed to me by my good friend, Pastor Judi Stricker. This story is told in a series of cartoon pictures, like

the old cartoon series in the newspapers used to be In the first picture there is a group of people, men and women, carrying big, heavy crosses. You can see they are struggling under the weight of these crosses.

The second picture focuses on one man carrying his cross. Like the others, he is having difficulty in

In the third picture the man has stopped and he has laid down his cross. He has a saw in his hand and he says to God, "Lord, it's too heavy ... Please cut it down a little..." The man then saws off a hunk from the bottom of his cross.

In the next image we see that he is no longer dragging his cross on the ground, for it is lighter and he is able to carry it more easily. In fact, he is whistling The other people are still walking around him,

dragging their very heavy crosses, as he carries his

The man goes a little farther and he lays his cross down again. He says to the Lord, "Lord, please cut it down a little more ... I'll be able to carry it better...." hikes this cross up onto his shoulder with ease, he burdens." says, "Lord, thank you so much."

In the next picture, we once again see the man

walking amidst the group of men and women. He is again whistling cheerfully and he has a bounce to his step, unlike the others around him, who are faithfully struggling with the full weight of their crosses.

All of a sudden the man comes upon a ravine.

As the other cross bearers come to the ravine, they lay their crosses over it: "Let's use this as a bridge and cross over...." And so with the strength and size of their crosses, the people are able to cross over this obstacle without difficulty.

The man watches this happen, and so he gives it a try with his cross. But he can't do it. His cross, which he chopped up to be lighter and smaller, is now too small to reach across the ravine to the other side.

In the final image we see the man kneeling on the side of the ravine, all alone, weeping because he cannot get across. The caption of the email says this: "We complain about the cross we bear, but don't realize it is preparing us for the dip in the road that God can see, and we cannot."

Our crosses, while heavy, do have the ability to make us stronger, and therefore more able to handle adversity. It all depends on how we use these crosses. Do we carry them with faith, determination and rely on the Lord to give us the strength to carry them? Or do we trust only in ourselves, complain about the cross, and in the end fail when a ravine comes our way?

Christ tells us to come to Him with our burdens and He will lighten them for us, for He will give us the strength to carry on. "Come to me and I will give you rest—all of you who work so hard beneath a heavy yoke. Wear my yoke —for it fits perfectly—and let The man pulls out his saw and cuts more wood off me teach you; for I am gentle and humble, and you the bottom of his cross, making it lighter still. 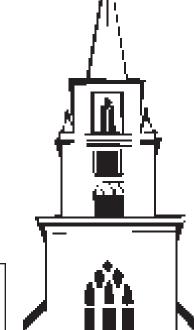
