The Decatur County ambulance service has gone to a "one page' system, allowing all of the volunteers to receive the same page for

Ambulance Director Linda Manning said at the meeting Tuesday, Feb. 19, she talked with the Jennings crew about their call roster, and they wanted to know if they could go to a one page system which would page the crews in Oberlin and Jennings at the same time. It would be easier for dispatch to only have to page one number, they said. Whoever responds to the call, said Ms. Manning, would still call dispatch and let them know.


