rado, basketball players play year around and attend individual and team camps and clinics during the summer, playing in AAU and MAYB leagues. Most successful programs also

start their players at a young age. It is not uncommon to see feeder teams learn the exact same offense and defense that the high school is running in elementary school. True, they do not learn all the program, but they are gradually feed the information starting in kindergarten.
