Commissioner Unger said that it will cost \$20 to \$25 per sign and he suggested that the county would be willing to put up the 400 or so needed signs if the townships would agree to buy the poles, bolts and numbers for each house or business.

The signs will be put on the right side of each driveway where it leaves the county road, he said. If there is a ditch, it will be behind the ditch. It will probably take county workers two to three years to get all the signs up, he said.

The township officials unanimously agreed to the proposal by a show of hands.

(Continued from Page 1A) 8. If roads or lanes deviate off a section line, they will maintain their name.

9. Roads that fall between section lines will get numbers between. For example, a road on a half-mile line might be called 950 Road or D5 Lane.

10. House numbers will progress from west to east and south to north, with 100 possible addresses between section lines. Residences on the west and north sides will have even numbers and those on the east and south will be odd.

11. Addresses are for the location of the primary entrances, not mailboxes. This address is for emergency response, not mail delivery.

12. Only inhabited residences or major businesses will get addresses to start with.


