James 1:13-15 When tempted, no one should say, 'God is tempting me." For God cannot be tempted by evil, nor does he tempt anyone; but each one is tempted when, by his own evil desire, he is dragged away and enticed. Then, after desire has conceived; it gives birth to sin; and sin, when it is full-grown,

Sometimes people are confused about temptation. They think they shouldn't have had that thought, or acknowledging that desire caused them to sin. But tempted in every way and yet he was without sin.

Actually, whenever you are tempted you have two choices, you can choose to do bad or you can choose to do good. Temptation can be a stumbling block to fall into evil or it can be a steppingstone to maturity. Whenever you recognize that you are being tempted, and you choose to do good, you are maturing in Christ keep your eyes on Christ. and becoming more Christ-like.
