- Request more vegetables and fruits with a meal.
- Keep starchy foods plain. For example, mashed potatoes can also have cream and butter which add fat.
- · Order baked, broiled and roasted foods for fewer calories.
- Beware of liquid calories, such as sugary drinks. Those calories add up fast without nutritional benefit. Split a meal with a friend or fam-
- ily member. You both benefit. • Ask for a "to go" box when you get your meal and split the meal before you eat.

Grace and peace to you in the name of Christ. My prayer for you today is that you will begin looking for ways to "go nuts for Jesus Christ," recognizing that: "The number one problem of the church today is numbing normality," and that, "Everything Jesus taught goes against how "normal" people see and function in the world." (Leonard Sweet)

Lately I've been reading, Jesus Drives Me Crazy, by Dr. Leonard Sweet, Earl Stanley Jones Professor of Evangelism at Drew Theological School. And this 2003 Zondervan publication will be a starting point for the sermonettes this month.

An acquaintance sent a politically motivated article about the presidential candidates, from a New York newspaper. The article was written by a journalist who was obviously prejudiced by the race, gender, generation and religious beliefs of the candidates.

candidates. Then he finished by stating facts purported to be found in a particular book of the Bible, that in fact, are not to be found anywhere in the Bible.

God's Word gives us a great many instructions to is. The wisdom of the world is "normal." People who sight." (1 Corinthians 3:19)

don't know who Jesus is are the "normal people." Disciples of Jesus are deviations. They mess up the world as it is, drawing outside the lines, thinking outside the box, resisting off-the-shelf solutions. Christians are part of the wisdom of the world that is to come."

Sweet suggests that, "If the only thing Jesus had given us was "The Beatitudes," it would flip our world upside down."

Consider a few of the things Jesus taught: The way (to be) first is (to be) last. The way of success is service. The way of attainment is relinquishment. The way of strength is weakness.

And the idea has been quoted by others over the centuries. Herman Melville wrote in Moby Dick, "Man's insanity is heaven's sense." In The Works of John Wesley, Albert Outler quotes Charles Wesley saying, "the wisdom of God" was always "foolishness The writer misquoted, or took out of context, with men." No marvel, then, that the great mystery everal things supposed to have been said by the of the gospel should be now also, "hid from the wise candidates.
