## Boys, girls edged out by Atwood

The Decatur Community High School boys and girls track teams both took second on Friday just behind Rawlins County at the Hoxie Invitational.

looks as good as the crop forecast.

"Heading into the 2008 season, the overall health of our crappie fishery, statewide, is above average." said Kansas Department of Wildlife biologist Kyle Austin.

Austin feels that Hillsdale, Toronto and Perry reservoirs will be strong places to fill the stringers.

From my personal experience, Milford and Tuttle Creek will produce slabs at least a foot long in strong cover.

Austin knows that the average life span of black and white crappie is five to six years. He believes that crappie reach the 10-inch minimum length in about four years.

"We monitor crappie fisheries statewide on an ongoing basis," he said. "We know that anglers in us closer and closer to summer.

As most fishermen know, minnow-tipped jigs are one of the best ways to catch the tasty critters.

Good anglers also fish minnows under slip-bobbers when they find crappie holding at 10 to 15 feet.

So, it's time to start looking through your tackle box and see what needs replacing.

As ice off begins just after the walleye spawn, crappie fishing will pick up again.

Aluminum Foil Trout Fillet 1 trout filet 1 teaspoon garlic (chopped) Butter Fresh parsley (chopped) Salt and pepper (to taste) 1 lemon

Aluminum foil

Spread out a 12-inch-by-12-inch sheet of heavy duty foil. Place a trout fillet on foil and sprinkle with garlic and a few pea sized scoops of butter. Top with parsley. Salt and pepper. Cut the lemon into wedges and squeeze the juice from one onto the fish. Fold the foil into a packet with sealed edges to keep in the steam as it cooks. Place the packet on the grill or onto a bed of hot coals. Cook about eight minutes, turn-

ing about every three minutes. Serve with the leftover lemon.
