2008 Walk Kansas progress

Wednesday, April 16, 2008

The 2008 "Walk Kansas" fitness program, sponsored by individual county Extension Offices in Kansas and by Kansas State Research and Extension, has just passed the half-way point. Because of this, a short summary of the results as they have been turned in follows:

The latest information which has been turned in state wide is that the "Walk Kansas" program has grown again. Approximately 20,500 people are participating in "Walk Kansas" this year. This is several hundred more than last year and numbers are still being turned into the main office at Kansas State

In Decatur, Gove, Norton, Sheridan and Trego Counties, 80 teams consisting of six individuals are participating for a total of approximately 480 participants.

In Decatur County, there are 21 teams or 126 participants. These people have been walking or doing some form of moderate physical exercise and reporting the amounts to the Extension Office since March 9. The goal is to walk 423 miles (or the equivalent of walking across Kansas) as a team during the eight week period ending May 3. Some teams report a little more regularly than others, so below you will see the results which have been reported as of April 9.

Jesus Drives Me Crazy

orayer for you today is that you will continue looking for ways to "Go Nuts for Jesus Christ," because your faith drives you crazy with love.

In his book, "Jesus Drives Me Crazy," Leonard Sweet writes, "Jesus wants to drive you crazy. In fact, the fundamental identity of a NUTS disciple is this: Someone who is crazy in love... with God, with life, with the world. There is nothing that makes you more passionate, more obsessed, or more crazed than being in love. We can't love God first. God first loved us. (1 John. 4:19) But NUTS disciples are lunatics for love - the first to love others.

Why does this sound haywire? Because popular culture has used this metaphor of "crazy" to help normal people bring life to a boil. I grew up listening to Patsy Kline's "Crazy." Paul Simon's "Still Crazy after All These Years" is a testimony I want sung at my funeral. My kids introduced me to Aerosmith's song "Crazy," and though I try hard to rid my ears of the ringing, I can still hear Brittany Spears sing "You Drive Me Crazy."

The aim of discipleship is a love relationship with God and life. We are to love others more than ourwe have become a "Me First Culture." I received an e-mail from a friend the other day that asked the question: "What would happen if we treated our Bible like we treat our cell phone?" Here's part of what he said: "What if we carried it around in our purse or pocket? What if we flipped through it several times a day? What if we turned back to go get it if we forgot

out it? What if we gave it to kids as gifts? What if we used it when we traveled? What if we used it in case of emergency?"

The technology we live with today has so consumed our lives with "Me" that we've lost track of the values system that enables Godly priorities in our lives. And the most important question becomes: How can we regain a Godly sense of values and witness it to

Sweet quotes novelist/priest Fred Buechner, "If the world is sane, then Jesus is mad as a hatter and the Last Supper is the Mad Tea Party. The world says, Mind your own business; and Jesus says, There is no such thing as your own business. The world says, Follow the wisest course and be a success; and Jesus says, Follow me and be crucified. The world says, Drive carefully, the life you save may be your own; and Jesus says, Whoever would save his life will lose it and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. The world says, Law and Order; and Jesus says Love. The world says, Get; and Jesus says, Give. In terms of the world's sanity, Jesus is crazy as a coot, and anybody who thinks he can follow him without being a little selves, but in that craziness that the world promotes, crazy too is laboring less under a cross and more under a delusion."


