It's not so easy to feed infants

Caring for an infant is no easy job! If you're a new parent, you may be learning feeding tips for the

If you're parenting a second time, such as a grandparent caring for a grandchild, chances are some guidelines have changed. It may be time to learn new ways!

Infants get sick more easily than adults. Food-related illness may cause fussiness, vomiting, diarrhea and fever. Give baby the gift of safe milk and food. Here are some current safe food handling guidelines.

Keep it clean. To help prevent germs from growing in milk and foods, keep your hands, utensils and counters clean while handling bottles and foods. For instance, wash your hands well with soap and water after petting an animal, using the restroom or handling a diaper.

Breast milk. When expressing breast milk, collect it in sterilized small plastic bottles or liners. Refrigerate up to five days, in the back of the refrigerator. To freeze, leave an inch of space at the top of the storage container to allow for expansion during freezing. Put the date on the container. If storing it in a freezer compartment of a refrigerator, use within two weeks. Use the oldest milk first.

Bottles and solids: Twice is not nice. If baby does not finish a bottle,

prayer for you today is that even when you feel that "Jesus is driving you crazy," you will always be the kind of Christian of whom others can say, "Thanks for being there."

In his book, "Jesus Drives Me Crazy," Leonard Sweet writes about Tina Sinatra's biography of her father, Frank Sinatra, "... dad was like a campfire, the point where we gathered and felt warm ... When he was with you he was really with you." Then Sweet says,"... the greatest compliment anyone can receive (is) "Thanks for ... being there."

Perhaps you've seen the recent ad campaign about friends and mental illness: "There's online friends. . friends to go out with on Saturday night . . .friends to hang out with and do nothing... friends who show up on moving day...

And then there are the friends who'll be there if someone is dealing with a mental illness..." Another version shows two friends sitting with video games in silence, while a voice over talks about mental illness, then one says to the other, "Hey man, whatever it takes, I'll be there.'

rupted me, she just listened until I was done. Whether she felt. But the most important thing I remember is his incarnation in the world today. that she never judged me." That came to mind last week as I was preparing a sermon on 1 Peter 1:17, to consider... Are you one of those friends? May God 'Since you call on a Father who judges each man's bless your craziness.

Grace and peace to you in the name of Christ. My work impartially, live your lives as strangers here in reverent fear."

> That scripture and the sermon it went with isn't exactly in the same context as my thoughts today. But isn't the sort of friendship my friend was talking about, the kind the mental illness ad is talking about, the kind Frank Sinatra demonstrated to his children, the kind Dr. Sweet refers to...the kind all of us hope to display when others need our help?

> Sweet describes a down time in his life when he shared his feelings with his best friend. The friend encouraged him in the situation he described, but, he says, the most important thing she said was, "No matter what you decide to do, Leonard, I will be there for you. . . no matter what!"

> Sweet says those two little words, "Be There" define the essence of the greatest thing that has happened in history since the creation of the universe, the incarnation. The essence of the incarnation is irradiating the human with the divine." God wants to turn normal people NUTS. How? "The life that he once lived on earth, he lives again in me.'

Whenever Christian people are able to live in such I've shared from the pulpit, a lady I visited with a "Be There" way as the stories above share...to be at a funeral dinner. Telling me about her departed that kind of friend who: is always there, is trusted to friend, she said, "She was always there when I needed keep a confidence, listens without interrupting, is someone to talk to. I could trust her not to tell anyone honest about what they feel, is not judgmental, but else what I'd shared in confidence. 
