Loans covering physical and/or production losses may be made at a 3.75 percent interest and scheduled for repayment as rapidly as possible, consistent with the applicant's abil-

Those covering physical losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, livestock or buildings (including homes).

To be eligible, an applicant must be operating a family-sized farm or ranch, unable to get credit elsewhere and a loss from the disaster.




