The Oberlin School Board hired a consulting firm to do an energy audit on the buildings in the district, hoping to save some money on power and heating bills.

After hearing presentations at its regular meeting Tuesday, April 15, from three firms, the board decided to hire Johnson Controls, which sent representatives from Omaha, Lenexa and Topeka, for a \$10,000 fee, though the work proposed by the a company to work with. firm will cost closer to \$1 million.

The other firms were TAC Americas of Lenexa and Custom Energy Services of Overland Park.

Johnson representatives Jon McCoy, Matt Leaper and Casey Lauer talked with the board about their observations after walking through both the high school and grade school twice

Mr. McCoy said his company had worked with Dr. Pat Cullen on a project in Nebraska. Johnson, said Mr. McCoy, is big into renewable energy, with wind farms and solar, and is also a financially strong

The company can solve heating problems at the schools, said Mr. Leaper, and part of the work can be paid for with energy savings.

Some of those energy savings will come from installing lights that use less power, he said, converting from steam heat to hot water and making sure things aren't unhooked that should be hooked up. There's an air-handling unit not working in the junior high area, Mr. Lauer noted.

Capturing those savings, said Mr. Lauer, will help pay for some of the changes for heating. The company uses local contractors when they can, said Mr. McCoy. The proposal should cost around

\$900,000 to \$1 million, said Mr. Leaper, but it could net the district a 25 percent energy savings. They didn't say what that savings would add up to, however. Currently

Ryan Freed with the Kansas Energy Commission from Topeka, said it's obvious that Kenny Black, district facilities maintenance supervisor, has done a good job.

In the end, he said, whichever company is hired could be the one the district works for the next 20 to 25 years. The state will help throughout the whole process, he said, and the cost will be based on how much the project costs.

The district not only has a chance to save energy, but also to improve the learning environment in the schools, said Mr. Freed.

Are you suggesting that the board not make a decision tonight? asked Mr. Nedland. Not at all, said Mr. Freed, because the district is on a timeline to get heat into the high school before it's cold again. At the high school there are two systems, one with steam and one with hot water. The school, said Dr. Cullen, is having problems with the steam system, it does work now, but they don't want to have any future problems and continue to put money into the system that needs to be

This year, he noted, there were major leaks in the steam lines at the high school. The board bought a new boiler and had the lines repaired, but there was serious damage to the stage floor in the auditorium which cost \$14,134 to repair, which insurance will cover.
