Board worries about low scores

The Oberlin School Board looked at sophomore class test scores from the past year, questioning why those on the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test and National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test came

in below the state average. The tests were taken by this year's junior class when they were sophomores, said Principal Charlie Haag. He showed the board graphs that showed the class scoring two points below the state average in critical reading and three points lower in writing skills.

On the PLAN test for the sophomores, said Mr. Haag, the scores for English, math, reading, science and composite were below the national ones.

On the ACT, said Mr. Haag, the Oberlin students scored higher than the state average on everything but college English composition. He said he isn't sure how many took the test but he thought it was 80 percent or more of the class.

The students take the tests around October, he said, so it isn't very far into the school year.

Is it unusual, said President Dewayne Jackson, for a class here to be said, the special education scores below the state average. Some of the

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students, said Mr. Haag, have been were not. below on all of the tests. Teacher Brenda Breth said it surprises her, because the sophomore class is a good bunch.

Anytime she sees a score below the state average, said Member Barb Olson, it concerns her. She said she would like to know what the trend has been, because if the trend is below state averages, then the district may need to address the problem.

Shelia Jansonious, counselor at the grade school, reported on the scores from the Iowa Test of Basic Skills the elementary students took. This test is just one measure, she said, adding that she didn't get all of the normal reports because of some software problems.

The students take the tests for a week in April, she said. The kindergarten through second grade take the core class test. From third grade on, the students take the tests in all the subjects.

Third grade, she said, is a big year because the kids not only take all of the tests, they read their own tests and also transfer the answers from the booklet to the bubble sheet.

In the 2005-'06 school year, she were listed separately. In 2007 they

At the kindergarten level, 62 percent scored in the 70th percentile, in first grade 63 percent, in second grade 55 percent, in third grade 68 percent, in fourth grade 74 percent, in fifth grade 55 percent and in sixth grade 42 percent.

According to the chart, the kindergartners, first grade, fourth grade and fifth grade did better on the tests than last year.

The only students who took the test who aren't included in the report, said Mrs. Jansonious, are those who took the tests off grade level. One or two extreme scores, either high or low, can make a difference in the outcome, she said, and not all students are good test takers.

Principal Duane Dorshorst said he and Mrs. Jansonious have talked about these tests and others. The Iowa Test of Basic Skills, he said, aren't as important to the kids as the state assessments. After three weeks of testing out of a month, said Mr. Dorshorst, the students get tired of of tests and that they have to do their best.

In state assessments, said Mr. Dorshorst, if the students don't meet the mark, then they are going to have to put some teeth into summer school.
