Lately, there has been the joke going around Hill City, that Thursday is a cursed day. It seems that for a couple of months this spring, the storms have come each Thursday evening. However, that string seems to be now broken as we got an early a.m. storm on Wednesday this week. It was the usual doozy, with wind, hail and driving rain that was not good for the crops - those that are still standing after hail and gale winds, that is.

When we come to think of it, right now things are pretty depressing all the way around. On the country music show of the 70's, Hee Haw, it was sung each show, "If it weren't for bad news, we'd have no news at all," and I think that is probably pretty true at the

Let's see, gasoline is at an all time high, food prices are rising at an alarming pace, and in some parts of the world, there is a frightening food shortage, the housing market has tanked, and the stock market is in the worst shape it has been for some time. Even though the prices for farm crops are high, the weather has certainly cut production. Yet, we must be aware that as Christians, even in the face of all of this, we must not be moved from the resolve that "All things work together for the good to those who love Him."

I got to thinking about this as I watched the interviews on CNN this week, with those affected by the flooding along the rivers in Iowa especially.
