The kids took turns walking from one spot marked with a X in masking tape to the next, each in front of a judge. As they moved from one to another to another, the contestants smiled at the judge, turned and showed off their dresses, capris, pants, tops and shoes.

The 4-H clothing construction, buymanship and fashion revue was the first event of the Decatur County Fair. Some of the 35 youths decided to buy their outfits and compete in "buymanship," while others made their own at home.

Ten displayed outfits made by sewing by hand and with a machine. These included a boy who had made pajama pants from material which showed the Kansas State University Wildcat; a girl with a green polkadot shirt and pants, a girl with a blue dress with butterflies on it and another in a brown homemade dress with a sash.

The kids told the judge of some of the difficulties they faced, including putting in pleats, zippers and getting the pattern to fit them.

Some contestants also took part in the buymanship part of the revue. All told, 25 kids showed off outfits they had purchased at stores, with matching shoes and accessories.
