Playing the Hand You're Dealt By Rev. Doug Hasty, **Oberlin and Prairie Chapel United Methodist Churches**

"God keeps his promises, and will not allow you to be tested beyond your power to remain firm; at the time you are put to the test, he will give you the strength to endure it, and so provide you with a way out." 1 Corinthians 10:13 TEV.

How would you describe your life? Which of these might best describe your life right now? My life is a roller coaster, a puzzle, a symphony, a journey, a circus, a minefield, or a dance. What about a carousel: sometimes you're up and sometimes you're down all the time spinning round and round. Someone said, "life is a deck of cards and you have to play the hand you are dealt!

Rick Warren in his book, "The Purpose Driven Life" suggest that the Bible gives us three metaphors that teach us God's view of life: Life is a test, life is a trust, and life is a temporary assignment. Let me share some thoughts about "life is a test!" Words like trials, temptations, refining, and testing occur more than 200 times in Holy Scripture. God tested Abraham by asking him to offer his son as a sacrifice. God tested Jacob by having him work seven additional years for his true love. Adam and Eve failed the test

Ruth, Esther, and Daniel.

God puts us to the test to build our character. I would dare say that your character is tested every day. The tests in life build up and reveal our true character. God constantly watches your response to people, problems, success, conflict, illness, disappointment, high gas prices and the weather!

We don't know all the tests God will give us, but we can predict some of them based on the Bible. You will be tested by major changes, delayed promises, impossible problems, unanswered prayers, undeserved criticism, and even senseless tragedies.

Some tests seem overwhelming, while others you don't even notice. All of them have eternal implications because we will take our character into eternity. Our character matters more to God than what we accumulate and our possessions. The good news is that God wants us to pass the tests of life, so he never allows the tests you face to be greater than the grace God gives you to handle them. Notice the Bible verse at the top of the page. Every time you pass a test, God notices and makes plans to reward you in eternity. Look at James 1:12, "Blessed are those who endure
