While the first half ended with St. Francis ahead by only two touchdowns, it was the disastrous second half, with numerous interceptions, that allowed the home team win by a disproportionate 52-8 in the firstround, or bi-district game.

Oberlin had not been to playoffs for several years. This year, however, the Class 2A District Red Devils had only three teams instead of the usual four. Since two teams out of each district get to go to the first round, both Oakley, which won the district, and Oberlin, which came in second, were eligible. The third team was Hoxie, which Oberlin beat

For bi-district play, the Decatur Community High team went to St. Francis to play the Indians for the first time this season. In fact, this was the first season in memory that the two teams were not scheduled

The Indians got the ball and took it 45 yards into the end zone in four plays. The two-point conversion made the score 8-0.

Shortly after that the Indians fumbled and Oberlin recovered on the St. Francis 28-yard line.
