Monday, Dec. 1, says Diane Barrett, county executive director for the U.S. Farm Service Agency.

Crops that may be eligible for these benefits are those which are not eligible here for crop insurance. Dec. 1 is the final date to pay the applicable service fee and obtain 2009 coverage for barley, rye, triticale, wheat, aquaculture, canola, Christmas trees, nursery crops, speltz and turf grass sod.

The administrative service fee is \$250 per crop for each county not to exceed \$750 in each county or \$1,875 total for one producer. Farmers must pay the fee and file office at 408 S. Buffalo.

Dec. 1 is also the final date to pay the applicable service fee and obtain coverage for all grasses. This program may cover 55 percent of average market price for the commodity if a natural disaster caused a 50 percent production loss or greater.

Operators must obtain coverage on all noninsurable crops and purchase crop insurance on all insurable crops to remain eligible for 2009 supplemental disaster assistance programs in the new Farm Bill.
